

Throughout the month of October our English Language Learners have been learning all about the season of fall and Halloween. We are incorporating themed activities into our every day learning. Students have been labeling pictures of spooky houses, pumpkins, and even Frankenstein! Our ELL's are becoming pro's at their letters, sounds, and sight words! We have also been discussing how Halloween can be celebrated in different cultures. Students who are new to our country are very excited to celebrate Halloween for the first time and to walk in our parade!









Mrs. Arencibia's class finds that Autumn is a great time of year to fall into reading!

As first graders bring home leveled reading books that target their individual reading readiness level, they bring with them many essential reading strategies to build their reading muscles as they grow into confident, strong, fluent readers.

Before reading the book, students begin "warming up their brains" by looking at the front and back covers, and taking a picture walk to get an idea of what will happen in the text. This is a way to connect with the text, and helps them to determine if the book will be a fiction text that tells a story, containing a beginning/middle/end structure, or if it is a non-fiction text that teaches them about a specific topic of interest.

Students have done a great job building their reading stamina as they stay actively engaged with the text. As students read, they are gently moving away from utilizing word patterns and basic sight words into a more fluid stage of reading, which combines using decoding and word attack skills with picture cues, context and meaning to read higher-level texts. They also self-monitor their reading in an effort to self-correct any miscues as they read.

When finished reading, students work on various skills to reflect upon and interpret what they have read. While some students are working on retelling facts from non-fiction books with accuracy/without prompting or looking back at the text, others may be retelling sequential story events including main characters, event details and endings. Others may be working on making connections to the text, which is identifying events from their life that remind them of the text. Others may be working on accurately interpreting the main idea of a text, or the lesson that the text demonstrates.

Certain questions can help prompt readers to reflect upon a text. Some questions may include asking the child to talk about what

happened in the book starting at the beginning, or what was the book mostly about, what did the story make them think of from their life, what was the problem the character was having in the story and how was it solved, etc.

It is equally important that early readers hear examples of fluent reading, which is why hearing teachers and parents read is highly beneficial at this stage. Even when the child is simply hearing a story, they can share about a favorite part, make connections and retell the text to demonstrate understanding. No matter what the skill or strategy, our first graders have been busy building their super reading muscles, and it is clear that their hard work is paying off as they continue to blossom into strong and confident readers!

Way to go, first graders!


Morning Meeting sets the tone for the day in Mrs. Janiec's Class

Coming together as a community of learners, as we transition from home to school each day in our classroom, is what Morning Meeting is all about. Morning Meeting is one component of a Responsive Classroom. Students think is it fun, but is it so much more. We practice social skills and public speaking while building a risk-free learning environment. Everyone participates regardless of academic ability.

Each day students participate in a greeting, a student shares and the class asks questions of the presenter, and the sharer reads a message about the day. Lastly, if there is time, we enjoy a group activity. Popcorn Count is a favorite. Students needed to show impulse control and keen observation skills as one at a time they pop up and call out the next number in a pattern. If two or more people popped, we started all over again. Seems easy? It is not. Our highest count this year is 20.
